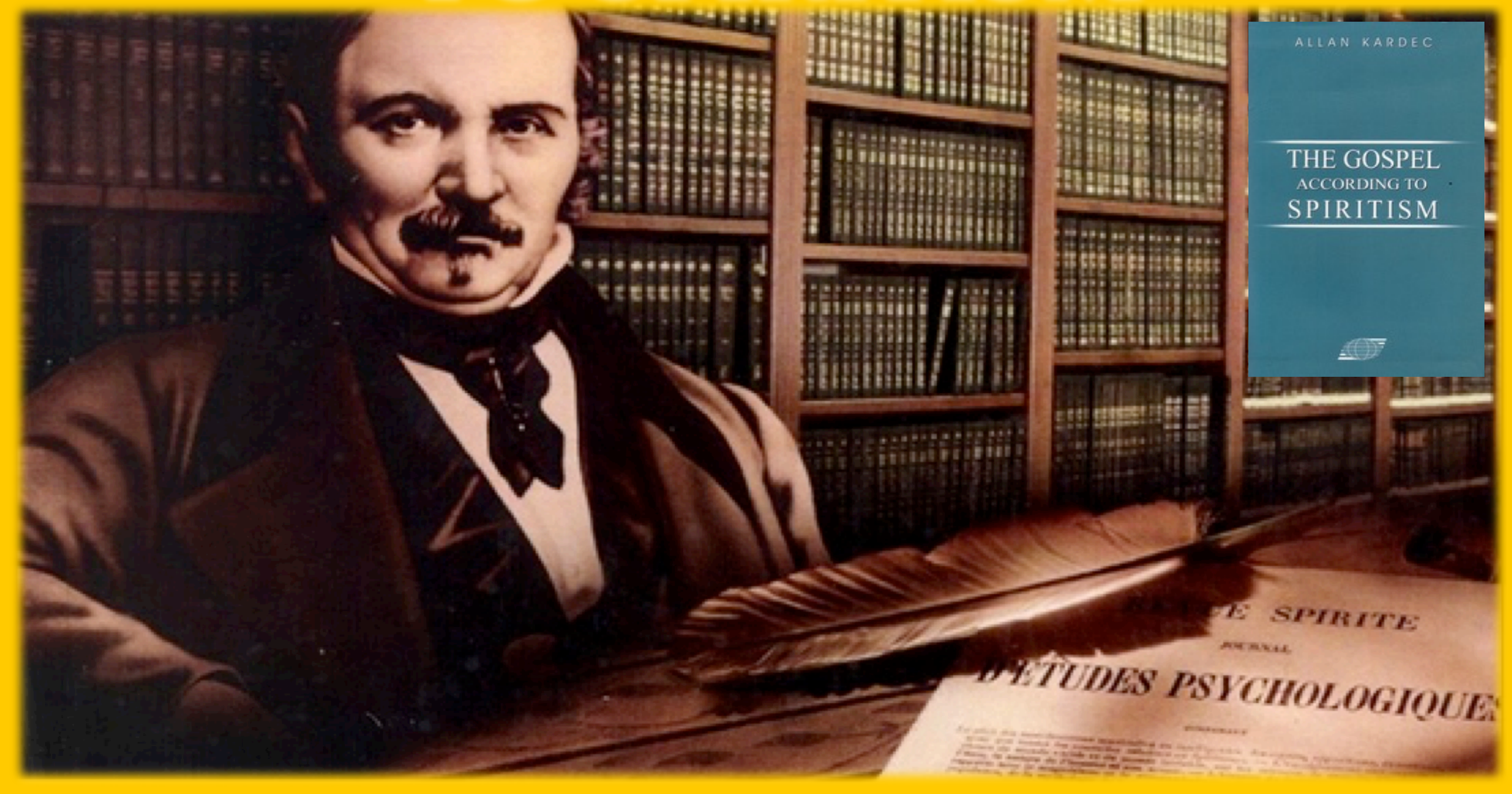


THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO SPIRITISM



OBJECTIVE

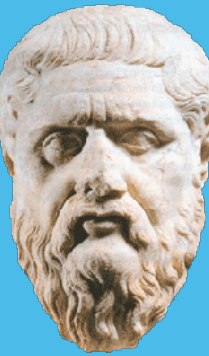

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." - Matthew, 5:4

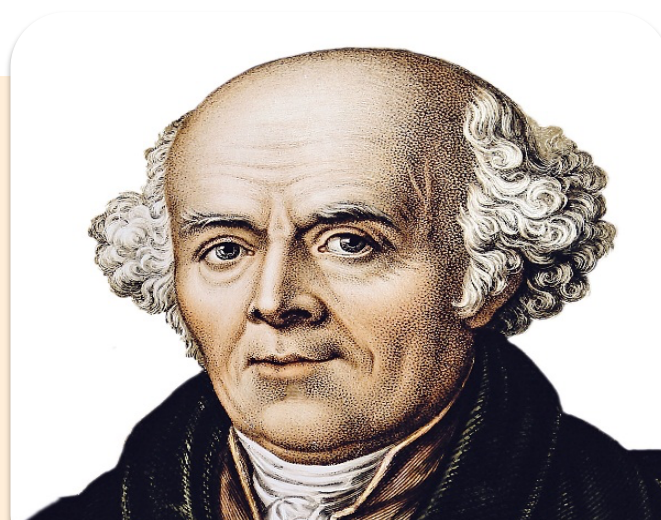
PRESENT AND PAST CAUSES

François Fénelon (1651-1715) was a French Roman Catholic theologian, poet and writer.



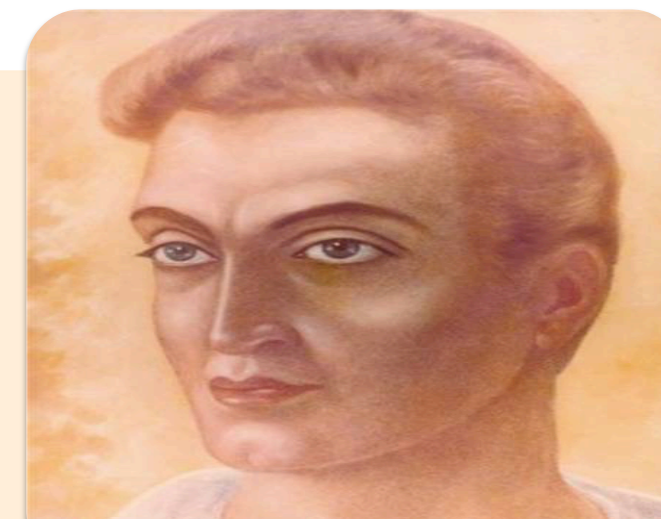
Blaise Pascal (1623-1662) was a French mathematician, physicist, and religious philosopher.

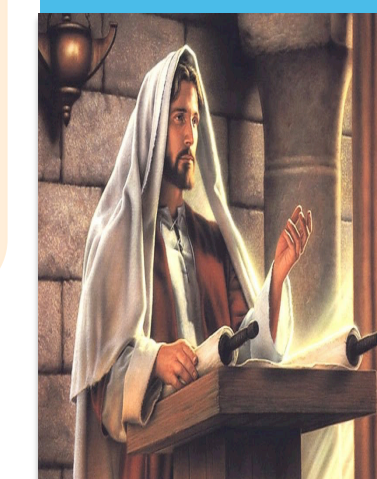

JESUS.

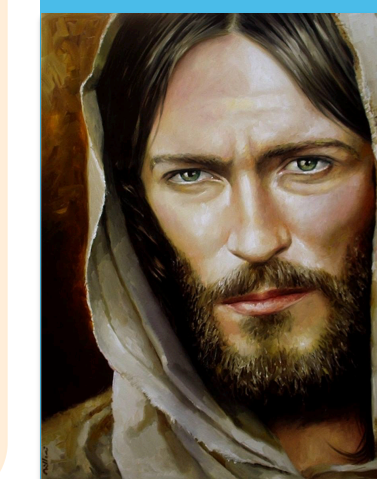
